Crossing The Bar

At our Change Of Watch dinner meeting we recognized the passing of a flotilla member, Ed Sussdorff of Port Henry, who died in November. An empty table and place setting was laid for him, a tradition for a friend gone missing.

Another maritime tradition is to recognize that the shipmate has "crossed the bar." What does that mean?

Peggy Burgess, FSO-MT/IS, read the tribute to Ed Sussdorff. She explained that "Crossing The Bar" is a poem by Alfred, Lord Tennyson, 1809-1892, Poet Laureate of Great Britain and Ireland. She read Tennyson's poem, "Crossing The Bar":

Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me!

And may there be no moaning of the bar,
When I put out to sea,
But such a tide as moving seems asleep,
Too full for sound and foam,
When that which drew from out the boundless deep
Turns again home.

Twilight and evening bell,
And after that the dark!
And may there be no sadness of farewell,
When I embark;

For though from out our bourne of Time and Place
The flood may bear me far,
I hope to see my Pilot face to face
When I have crossed the bar.

The "bar" refers to the sand bar that often fronts a harbor, where surf can be dangerous. From the deep sea, the bar is crossed inward to a safe harbor. Leaving the safe harbor outward bound, the bar is crossed again, heading out to the ocean and the great unknown.



Challenge Coins

Another military tradition is the presentation of challenge coins. At our Division Change of Watch in November, three 15-8 members – Carl Duford, Frank Williams and Peggy Burgess – each received one of these challenge coins from Sr. Chief Daniel Murray, Station Burlington:





Issued by U.S. Coast Guard Sector Northern New England (New York, Vermont, Maine and New Hampshire), the coins were presented to our members for over 500 hours of service in 2012 beyond operations or other missions. They're now members of the "Lake Champlain 500" club.

According to Wikipedia: "The tradition of coin- giving dates back to Vietnam when soldiers would tote along a piece of "lucky" ordnance that had helped them or narrowly missed them. At first it was small arms ammunition, but this practice grew to much bigger and more dangerous ordnance as time wound on. It became a dangerous practice so commanders banned it, and instead gave away metal coins emblazoned with the unit crest or something similar.

"The main purpose of the ordnance had been when going into a bar, you had to have your lucky piece or you had to buy drinks for all who did have it. The coins worked far better in this regard as they were smaller and not as lethal!

"So, if you go to a military bar, whip out a challenge coin and slam it down on the bar, those who lack one buy drinks! Obviously you have to be careful about this tradition. However, commanders and units give out coins for this and as mementos for services rendered or special occasions."

Favorite Website: Revenue Cutters

From time to time we run across a free website on the internet that is just so good we have to share it. However, we will not list anything here that requires a digital download or payment of money.

One of my personal interests is the history of the early Coast Guard, from 1790 through the War of 1812. In 1790, it was established as the Revenue-Marine, later designated as the Revenue Cutter Service in 1894 and finally the Coast Guard in 1915.

The early vessels were commonly called "revenue cutters", usually a topsail schooner no more than 60-feet in length. They were fast and lightly armed with one or more deck guns and a handful of muskets, pistols and cutlasses for the small crew who might be expected to engage and board another vessel suspected of smuggling.
